#### Sessions 3: Antiracism

The large group discussion was based on two video interviews of Dr. Kendi and a short article he wrote for the September issue of *The Atlantic*. The discussion was recorded, so if you were unable to attend the live session, you can watch the video.

#### Session 4: Topic TBA

We polled participants at the end of the September session about their preference for the next discussion topic. They voted to discuss a new topic rather than continue to elaborate the previous three discussion topics.

So, for the October 28 session, we will discuss another aspect of racism. The Diversity Committee will select the next topic and associated materials when we meet on September 30. And we will send an email announcement to the membership with the topic selected. Possible choices include implicit bias, confederate monuments, posttraumatic slave syndrome, and the 1619 Project.



# **Great Read from the Diversity Committee**

This month's recommendation is *In the Shadow of Statues: A White Southerner Confronts History* by Mitch Landrieu. The following description comes from Penguin/Random House, the book's publisher.

The New Orleans mayor who removed the Confederate statues confronts the racism that shapes us and argues for White America to reckon with its past. A passionate, personal, urgent book from the man who sparked a national debate.

"There is a difference between remembrance of history and reverence for it." When Mitch Landrieu addressed the people of New Orleans in May 2017 about his decision to take down four Confederate monuments, including the statue of Robert E. Lee, he struck a nerve nationally, and his speech has now been heard or seen by millions across the country. In his first book, Mayor Landrieu discusses his personal journey on race as well as the path he took to making the decision to remove the



monuments, tackles the broader history of slavery, race and institutional inequities that still bedevil America, and traces his personal relationship to this history. His father, as state legislator and mayor, was a huge force in the integration of New Orleans in the 1960s and 19070s. Landrieu grew up with a progressive education in one of the nation's most racially divided cities, but even he had to relearn Southern history as it really happened. Equal parts unblinking memoir, history, and prescription for finally confronting America's most painful legacy, In the Shadow of Statues contributes strongly to the national conversation about race in the age of Donald Trump, at a time when racism is resurgent with seemingly tacit approval from the highest levels of government and when too many Americans have a misplaced nostalgia for a time and place that never existed.

### **Movie Recommendation from Ginny Rivera**



My son, Alex Rivera, and Cristina Ibarra, his partner in life and in film, have made a documentary about immigration, *The Infiltrators*. Its premiere was at the Sundance Film Festival at the end of January 2019, where it won the NEXT Innovator Award and the Audience Award. This year, they had plans to go to New York City at the end of March to see it open in a

theater, but the pandemic cancelled that. Now, you will have a chance to see the film; it will be on the PBS show, *POV*, on Monday, October 5.

*The Infiltrators* describes events during the Obama Administration; young Latino activists get themselves locked up in a privatized Florida detention center, where they work to free detainees. It blends documentary footage with scripted scenes. I think you will appreciate the film...and feel free to ask me about it.


