Racism Discussion Series

Session 1: Racism 101

The Diversity Committee launched its online Racism Discussion Series on July 22. Twenty-five people participated in the discussion, which was based on the website Racism 101 (<https://www.showingupforracialjustice.org/racism-101.html>). The session began with a viewing of a brief video: *The Look* (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=aJav36Nbn58>) and discussion focused on participants' observation of instances of individual, institutional, and systemic or structural racism.

Session 2: White Privilege

Session 2 was held on August 26 and focused on White privilege; 34 people participated. For this session, participants viewed a brief video demonstrating White privilege (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Y3QmO5djgY&t=6s>), and they read *White Privilege: Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack* (<https://www.racialequitytools.org/resourcefiles/mcintosh.pdf>); Dr. Peggy McIntosh, the article's author, joined the discussion. Dr. McIntosh shared how she came to see White privilege, and she led a wrap-up discussion of how we can use our unearned privilege to weaken systemic privilege. Video of this session will be available until September 18. All participants received a link to the video; if you were not able to participate but would like to view the video, send an email to divcomaauw@gmail.com to request the link.

Session 3: Antiracism

The third session in the Diversity Committee's Racism Discussion Series will be at 10:30 a.m. on September 23 via Zoom. The topic will be antiracism, and discussion will be based on the work of Ibram X. Kendi, author of *How to Be an Antiracist* (see page 7 of this newsletter). In preparation, participants will be asked to view a 12-minute video of Dr. Kendi being interviewed about antiracism and read a brief article he wrote for the September 2020 issue of *The Atlantic*; participants can also opt to read a longer article from the same magazine. Links to these resources will be sent along with the Zoom invitation.

If you would like to join the discussion, send an email to divcomaauw@gmail.com and provide your name, email address, and phone number. Feel free to share the registration information with friends as the series is free and open to the public. If you have registered for a previous session, you will not have to register again; you will automatically receive a Zoom invitation.

All sessions will be recorded so if you can't make it to the live discussion you can watch the video after the fact.

Membership

Our branch currently has 106 paid members. Two are student affiliates and a third is our student finishing her degree.

The AAUW National Board of Directors will consider and vote on a change in Individual Member dues at their upcoming Board meeting on October 16, 2020. Any increase would take effect on July 1, 2021. The Board will consider two different options:

- An increase to take effect on July 1, 2021, of an amount between \$3 and \$10.
- An increase to take effect on the 1st of July of each of the next three fiscal years of between \$3 and \$10 each year.

The selection of either option, and the exact amount of the increase for the option chosen, will be determined by the board at its October meeting. Any change to Individual Member dues will impact paid Life Membership as well, since AAUW's bylaws require paid Life Membership to equal 20 years of annual dues. The Board is not considering a change to College/University Member dues at this time.

Membership dues cover between 15% and 20% of AAUW's annual budget. While AAUW's expenses increase annually, in recent years dues have not increased with enough regularity to keep pace with expenses. Increasing Individual Member dues will help AAUW cover more expenses, including important functions like the Connect team, critical technology and infrastructure such as the website and Member Services Database, and other member support.

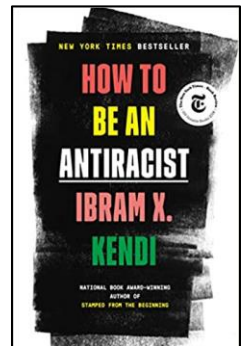
Our in-person activities are on hiatus. Check with the coordinators for when they will resume.

Great Read from the Diversity Committee

Beginning this year, the Diversity Committee will be offering suggestions of books about racism and social justice that committee members have read and recommend. This continuing column replaces the Heritage Month articles that the committee has published for the last two years. This month's recommendation is ***How to be an Antiracist*** by Ibram X. Kendi. The following description comes from Penguin/Random House, the book's publisher.

Antiracism is a transformative concept that reorients and reenergizes the conversation about racism—and, even more fundamentally, points us toward liberating new ways of thinking about ourselves and each other.

At its core, racism is a powerful system that creates false hierarchies of human value; its warped logic extends beyond race, from the way we regard people of different ethnicities or skin colors to the way we treat people of different sexes, gender identities, and body types. Racism intersects with class and culture and geography and even changes the way we see and value ourselves.



*In ***How to Be an Antiracist***, Kendi takes readers through a widening circle of antiracist ideas—from the most basic concepts to visionary possibilities—that will help readers see all forms of racism clearly, understand their poisonous consequences, and work to oppose them in our systems and in ourselves.*

Kendi weaves an electrifying combination of ethics, history, law, and science with his own personal story of awakening to antiracism. This is an essential work for anyone who wants to go beyond the awareness of racism to the next step: contributing to the formation of a just and equitable society.
