A Celebration of Black History: 40 Acres and a Mule



Beverly Steele, founder of Young Performing Artists (YPA) in Royal, FL, will speak at our February General Meeting to commemorate Black History Month and celebrate the achievements of African Americans. YPA encourages young artists and provides creative solutions to youth development. Royal is one of Florida's oldest African American Communities, formed in 1865 by freed slaves whose descendants have

kept their land. The YPA presents a Royal Historic Tour, *40 Acres and a Mule*, to share the history of African Americans in our local area, which reflects the history of the country at large. For our meeting, Ms. Steele has adapted the live tour for presentation in the Zoom environment.

So be sure to join us on February 20 to commemorate Black History Month and celebrate the local Black community.

Celebrating Women's History Month: A delayed Commemoration of the 100th Anniversary of the Ratification of the 19th Amendment

Our March General Meeting will showcase a special celebration of the suffragists who fought for nearly a century to win the right, by law, for women to vote in national or local elections.

Dorothy Dobbs, a long-time member of our AAUW branch will lead our program, joining with several other women to give profiles of several suffragists in the full period costumes of purple, white, and gold, which were colors of the U.S. suffrage movement.



Why these colors? In the early 1900s, suffragists began to realize the need to come up with a brand, just as their fellow British suffragettes had done. They wanted to convey that they were smart, capable women who would bring civility to politics with the vote.

British women were using green, white, and violet, which stood for “give women the vote,” while also representing royalty, freedom, purity, and hope. American women replaced green with gold to pay homage to the use of the sunflower in the 1867 suffrage referendum campaign but decided to keep purple and white.

Purple would come to stand for loyalty, white for purity, and gold for hope. Today, women continue to wear the color white to pay tribute to the suffragists and the continued fight for women’s rights.

So, feel free to wear the colors, a hat, or other memorabilia to show your solidarity with these brave women. And, Dorothy, never failing to deliver us with a bit of entertainment, will also lead us through a few suffragist songs! Please be sure to attend this informative and entertaining program as we celebrate Women’s History Month. See you March 20th on Zoom...I’ll be the one in the wide brim black and white hat with a sunflower tucked in the band!

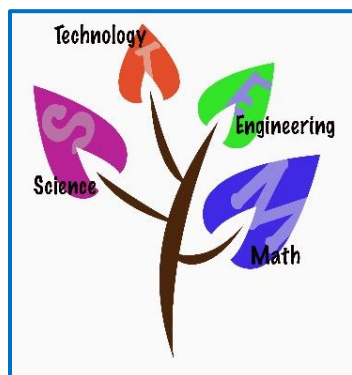
Survey. In late December, the Diversity Committee sent a link to a Survey Monkey questionnaire designed to evaluate the impact of the discussion series. The survey invited anyone who had attended at least one of the first five sessions to respond. By the time the survey closed on January 18, we received responses from 33 of the 48 people who had attended at least one of the discussions; this represents a 69% response rate from discussion participants. Judy Bonn attended a meeting of the AAUW Branch Public Policy Chairs to prepare for Lobby Day, which will be virtual this year.

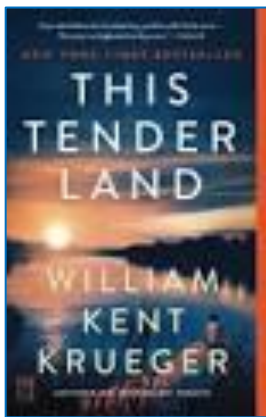

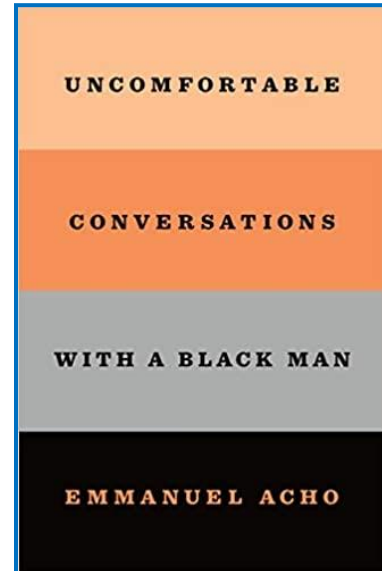

Great Read from the Diversity Committee

This month's Great Read is *Uncomfortable Conversations with a Black Man* by Emmanuel Acho. The following information comes from the book's publisher.

Emmanuel Acho grew up in Dallas with his three siblings, the son of Nigerian immigrant parents. In 2012 he was drafted into the NFL by the Cleveland Browns, and later played with the Philadelphia Eagles, while earning a master's degree in sports psychology at the University of Texas in the off seasons. In 2016 he left the NFL for ESPN, where he served as the youngest national football analyst, and was named a 2018 Forbes Under 30 Selection. He is now a Fox Sports analyst and the creator of the ongoing online video series "Uncomfortable Conversations with a Black Man."

An urgent primer on race and racism, from the host of the viral hit video series



"You cannot fix a problem you do not know you have." So begins Emmanuel Acho in his essential guide to the truths Americans need to know to address the systemic racism that has recently electrified protests in all fifty states. "There is a fix," Acho says. "But in order to access it, we're going to have to have some uncomfortable conversations."

*In **Uncomfortable Conversations with a Black Man**, Acho takes on all the questions, large and small, insensitive and taboo, many white Americans are afraid to ask—yet which all Americans need the answers to, now more than ever. With the same open-hearted generosity that has made his video series a phenomenon, Acho explains the vital core of such fraught concepts as white privilege, cultural appropriation, and "reverse racism." In his own words, he provides a space of compassion and understanding in a discussion that can lack both. He asks only for the reader's curiosity—but along the way, he will galvanize all of us to join the antiracist fight.*

"Emmanuel Acho answers questions that many white folks have thought but either did not know who or how to ask and does so in a non-threatening, engaging style. It is especially helpful for those who are newly contemplating or just beginning their journey to becoming antiracist. Especially helpful are suggestions of what his readers can do with their newly found "aha" moments to assist in the work to eradicate racism as well as a comprehensive list of resources to help in learning more about this critical topic."
